# Natalie writes first novel - at 14

SHE plays the violin, competes in the high jump and took her Spanish GCSE two years early.

But now one talented teenager has surpassed those achievements by setting up her own company to publish her first novel - aged just 14.

Where most teenagers would rather watch television or play computer games rather than pick up a book, Natalie Igharo has spent the past two years putting the finishing touches to her novel, *The Robotic Tales*.

Natalie, of Windmill Platt, Handcross, said: "I enjoy writing and it was fun so I made time to finish it."

"I like the freedom of making up whatever you want and being able to control it."

tells the story of a group of child spies, who try to rescue the world from the tyrannical robot, Klikko.

The vision of a robot-run future has parallels with some of Natalie's favourite books.

She said: "George Orwell is my favourite author. I love 1984 because it is so shocking. But my favourite book is Harry Potter And The Philosopher's Stone because it is so well written."

Natalie, who attends St Paul's Catholic College in Jane Murray Way, Burgess Hill, set up her own publishing company to release the book after a number of companies rejected it. Natalie and her father, Monday, have had 100 copies of the novel printed and have been touring Sussex schools to drum up support.

Natalie said: "I sent it to lots of publishers but they all said they couldn't sign a contract with a child. We looked into self-

publishing companies but they charged about £8,000 so we decided to print the book ourselves."

Her mother, Philomena, and siblings Matthew, eight, and Charlotte, 12, are proud of what she has achieved.

But Natalie admits she gets nervous when other people read her book.

She said: "My brother and sister like it but I get a bit worried when people read my book, especially if I know them. My friends think it's cool and a few of them have bought copies."

The teenager will not be having a break during the summer holidays, because she has already begun work on a sequel.

She said: "I hope to get a lot of it done by the end of the holidays."
